
















A message from Miss Hardy






A message from Mrs Warburton









Miss Snooks and Mrs Taylor's group have been doing dinosaur topic work, writing, skipping and social distance play.

Mr Charman's group have been doing writing, creating dinosaurs, becoming snails and some socially distanced picture orienteering. Looks like fun!!











SHIP SAILS LAST NIGHT WITH NO LIGHT

Last night, villagers helped the lighthouse keeper (Bill Withers – 57) guide a ship to safety when the light went out in the lighthouse from dangerous rocks. The lighthouse keeper told us "I don't know why exactly the light went out it might have been the storm or it might have just been old."

When the lighthouse keeper was trying to fix the light, he accidentally dropped the new light and it broke into pieces. Themin Rock lighthouse was unfixable with a ship on the <u>way</u>..

The lighthouse is over 100 years old; stands on a very hazardous coastline full of ragged rocks, not the best place for ships to go sailing. The village has a population of around 250 people. Villagers told us that he likes to be on his own and hardly ever comes into the village.

The villagers were surprised to see him in such a hurry to tell them his plan to save the ship "I've never seen him move so fast in my life," exclaimed a villager. A few minutes later the word had spread across Themin and everyone had lanterns.

The ragged coastline was magnificent last night as people shone lanterns on the clifftop. The vessel started to turn very slightly away from the rocks as the crew started waving from the stern. The villagers cheered as the ship neared the harbour. "The coastline just seemed to light up, from darkness to light." reported a crew member.

The lighthouse is currently being fixed by the lighthouse keeper and will hopefully be shining tonight. The crew of the ship thanked the villagers for saving them and there ship and hope to go sailing again soon.


